8th ANNUAL "MARCH IS WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH" PROGRAM FEATURES WOMEN IN THE WESTWARD MOVEMENT

This year's March is Women's History Month Program will feature Margaret Goodart speaking on *Women on the Overland Trail, 1840-1870*. Goodart states, "Thousands of women went westward on the Overland Trail and left a remarkable record of their pioneer journeys. They wrote letters, kept journals, and reminisced about their travels in memoirs penned long after their adventures were over. Thus historians who are interested

in this subject have rich sources of primary materials from which to work.

The result has been an abundance of books and articles that focus on this aspect of the history of American women. Another outcome has been the development of a major controversy among historians as to whether or not women were liberated by their western experiences." Goodart proposes to describe the conditions faced by these pioneer women, discuss the evidence used by historians on both sides of the controversy, and explain her conclusions.

She continues, "I think this is an issue that will interest people of Plumas County because most of the first female settlers of this region were veterans of that overland trek. I hope this presentation will give people greater appreciation of the courage, stamina, and resourcefulness of women who traveled west in the middle of the nineteenth century."

Margaret Goodart retired and moved to Quincy in 2002 after teaching in the History Department at California State University, Sacramento for 35 years. As a child, Margaret lived with her grandparents at Camp Wallace-Alexander and attended school in Quincy.

SPANISH PEAK ENGINE NO. 2 RAILROAD PROJECT


