

5<sup>th</sup> Annual Grave Occasion To Be Held September 20, 2014



Folks are dying (pun intended, of course) to get into the historic Quincy Cemetery to enjoy the festivities to be held on Saturday, September 20, 2014. This is the fifth year in a row that the Plumas County Museum has presented this extremely popular event.

This year's historic character lineup consists of Alan & Lucina Welden, D.R. & Jane Finlayson, I.C. Boring, Max Schooler, Jim & Ida Dempsey, James & Jane Edwards, Manuel Herrick, William & Lydia Schlatter, James & Nancy Yeates, Ella Peter, and a few others.

Tina Terrazas, also one of the actors, is in charge of wrangling the local actors who will impersonate the historic characters, as well as producing the dinner session entertainment. Along with wine and hors d'oeuvres, there will be a silent auction assembled by Sandra Lee, Denise Russell and Diane Uchytil. The auction will be chock-full of great items to bid on. Following the cemetery tours Bill & Sue Wickman will be serving up their signature barbecued pork tenderloin, tri-tip and wedding potato dinner while Tina Terrazas and company entertain guests.

The Feather River A's will have their sparkling autos lined up in the cemetery's main promenade for visitors to admire.

The event starts at 3:00 and goes until dusk. Be sure to get your tickets now as they sell out quickly and we have only a limited number available. Speaking of cemeteries, on Saturday, June 28, over 111 people converged on the historic Johnsville Cemetery to hear reenactments of the lives of Robert & Mary Penman, Dr. Charles Hill, and Eleanor & John Redstreake by Tina Terrazas and Bob Shipp, along with short biographies by Museum Director Scott Lawson of a number of others interred there. After the cemetery event, the crowd moved on to the Johnsville Historical Society's restored Catholic Church for a tour and talk by David Daun. He then led a walking tour from there to the Iron Door where participants enjoyed hors d'oeuvres and libations. We are planning to hold a similar event at the Meadow Valley Cemetery this coming spring.

### BLACKSMITHING AT THE MUSEUM

Our Master Blacksmith and Museum Docent Ray Nichol performed his red-hot iron working wizardry at the Museum's Blacksmith Shop this summer.

Blacksmiths were, until the early 20th century, an indispensable part of every community. Quincy boasted at least four different shops at the same time, and untold numbers of such craftsmen at various mines, logging camps and ranches throughout the county. This semi-lost art has been revived in recent years primarily to craft

household and decorative items rather than fixing wagons, shoeing oxen and manufacturing tools, many unique to a certain job.

Call the Museum and see if Ray is at work, and come enjoy the various exhibits at the Plumas County Museum.
